MSA New Campus at 6th of October City

Brief:

MSA University has been established as the natural outcome of nearly half a century of experience in the field of education on both the local and international levels. While we value our tradition which goes back to nearly half a century ago, we have an eye on every new trend, with an attitude not only to react to change but to also lead it.

Over an area of 50 feddans in the 6th of October City, the MSA new campus has been built on only 17% of the total land area, by sheer individual endeavors and personal financial resources with no claim to bank borrowings nor increase in tuition fees. The highest technological standards in every aspect of the educational process have been followed, aiming at maximum comfort and flexibility for a student body from over 30 nationalities.

The neo-classical look of the new campus with its state-of-the-art facilities strongly contributes to its unique standing as an institution of educational excellence. The very careful consideration of spacious and highly sophisticated labs equipped according to the worldwide specifications standards, the e-libraries, the highly automated classrooms and lecture halls, the buildings of students' facilities, the Roman amphitheatre, and the spacious green areas, highlight the magnificence, enhance the atmosphere of comfort and discipline and inspire an overall feeling of integrity and loyalty to this great accomplishment.

The design of the campus took nearly three years, and it allows for further future horizontal and vertical expansions. The current phase accommodates 108 labs and studios, 74 class rooms, 14 large lecture halls, 3 dentistry clinics, 2 operations rooms, 6 drafting studios, 2 libraries, 31 faculty rooms and 17 rooms for assistants, all connected to the internet and have e-mail, and data show facilities. The science labs cover analytical chemistry, physical chemistry, pharmaceutical chemistry, organic chemistry, biotechnology, pharmacognosy, pharmaceuticals, microbiology, physiology, anatomy, histology, pathology, biotechnology, pharmacology. Labs are connected to preparation rooms providing all needed equipment facilities. Moreover, 14 labs for engineering, 13 for mass communication, 3 for Languages, 25 for computers, are available.

The buildings are separated by green areas providing higher comfort in a friendly environment. The Scientific Faculties buildings comprise Dentistry,

Pharmacy, Engineering, Bio-technology and Computer Science, and the Faculties of Humanities include the faculties of Languages, Mass Communication and Business Management.

As you know, 1999 has become another record year for the IGCSE examination in Egypt. The number of candidates from schools in Cairo exceeded 3200, an increase of almost 30% compared to the June examination last year. The IGCSE is taken in more than 100 countries throughout the world, and the examination is growing faster in Egypt than anywhere else.

The performance of candidates in Egypt has always been excellent. However, as the number of candidates increases, their results seem to get better year by year, and in the June examination the candidates performed even better than in any of the previous years. In recent years, large numbers of candidates have opted to take AS and A level, although subjects at these higher levels have not been a requirement for admission to Egyptian Universities. Again, the results have been excellent.

I would like you to take particular note of the remarkable performance of candidates from Dar El Tarbiah. The first candidates from Dar El Tarbiah took the IGCSE soon after its introduction into Egypt in 1991, and since then the School has made a major contribution to the development of the IGCSE in Egypt. With more than 900 candidates, the School is the largest school in the World offering Cambridge examinations and is well known in Cambridge for its remarkable results in all subjects. The students from Dar El Tarbiah are amongst the very best IGCSE students in the world. Evidence of their excellence is certainly not hard to find, and the following observations clearly indicate their remarkable achievements.

Outstanding performance in IGCSE is acknowledged by the grade A*, which is awarded only to the very best candidates in each subject. Students at Dar El Tarbiah were awarded a total of 261 A* grades.

86 of the IGCSE candidates from Dar El Tarbiah were awarded either A* or A in all their subjects, and 120 AS/A level students achieved grade A, which is the highest grade awarded, in each of their subjects.

In IGCSE Chemistry, there were more than 400 candidates from Dar El Tarbiah, and 45% were awarded grade A* or grade A. This compares very favourably to students elsewhere, including the UK, where in Science subjects about 15% of students are awarded grade A or better.

There were 435 candidates from Dar El Tarbiah for IGCSE Biology of which 19% were awarded A*. This is a remarkable performance when compared to the Rest of the World where less than 3% of the candidates for Biology reached a similar standard. Of the 435 candidates, 196 (45%) were awarded A* or A.

In IGCSE Physics, there were 297 candidates from Dar El Tarbiah of whom 39% were awarded A or A* and 278 were awarded grade C or better. Grade C is the minimum passing grade.

IGCSE, AS AND A LEVEL 1997

As you know, the Syndicate has always been happy to acknowledge the success of candidates in Egypt, and it is a pleasure to be able to do so again. In the case of candidates from Dar El Tarbiah, it is very pleasing to note that the very high standards established in previous years have been maintained, and the achievements of the candidates must be a source of much satisfaction to you and your staff. I thought that the following particular points taken from the June 1997 examination might be of interest to you.

Of the 423 candidates from Dar El Tarbiah who attempted either AS or A level Mathematics, 185 (44%) were awarded grade A, the highest grade.

More than half of the 376 candidates for IGCSE Chemistry were awarded either A* or A.

Of the 309 candidates entered for IGCSE Physics, 62 candidates were awarded A* and a further 92 were awarded grade A.

In IGCSE Accounting, 2 candidates from Dar El Tarbiah scored almost full marks. There were a total of 1499 candidates from all countries, and no other candidate did better.

A candidate from Dar El Tarbiah was ranked second out of a total of over 4000 candidates for IGCSE English Literature.

I hope you will find this information interesting and helpful.


It was also good to see candidates from Dar El Tarbiah doing so well in the less popular IGCSE subjects such as French and Sociology. In these subjects, well over half of the candidates were awarded A* or A.

Large numbers of students at Dar El Tarbiah are now taking AS and A levels. These are higher level courses that are taken throughout the world, including the UK. They are intended to prepare students for university study, and are usually taken by students aged at least 18. The results of students from Dar El Tarbiah are again excellent. For example, Mathematics has always been strong in the school, and this year a total of 362 students took either AS or A level. 32% of the candidates were awarded grade A, which is the highest possible grade, and 91% of the candidates reached passing grades.

As you can see, the performance of the Dar El Tarbiah students is remarkable by any standards. It is very surprising that the IGCSE candidates from the School have been so successful at winning places at universities, and all the evidence is that they continue to do very well after they have left the school.

As you know, I am proud of the IGCSE examination in Egypt and constantly delighted by the excellence of the candidates. Cambridge International Examinations is indeed privileged to be associated with schools such as Dar El Tarbiah, and I would be grateful if you would convey my congratulations to the Dr El Digwi. I would also be grateful if Dr El Digwi could pass the congratulations of Cambridge International Examinations to the staff of the School and, of course, to the students.

IGCSE JUNE 1995

As you know I have written an open letter to John McCullough at the British Council. The intention of the letter was to bring to the attention of the Council some aspects of the performance of candidates from Egypt in last year's examination. Mr McCullough has since copied the letter to all the IGCSE Schools in Cairo and Alexandria, and he has suggested to Headteachers and Principals that I would be willing to provide further information about the performance of candidates in particular schools. This offer is open to all Schools, and he has already indicated that you would like to know more about the performance of candidates at Dar El Tarbiah. I have looked carefully at the results of your candidates, and I thought that the following information might be of interest to you.

- In IGCSE Physics, 16.7% of the Dar El Tarbiah candidates were awarded grade A*. This compares with 7.0 % for all other centres in the rest of the world
- In A level Mathematics, 65 of the 78 candidates (83.3%) were awarded grade A which is the highest possible grade
- In IGCSE Accounting, there were 410 candidates from 15 different countries, and the highest mark was scored by a candidate from Dar El Tarbiah
- In IGCSE Mathematics, one candidate from the School was only 2 marks short of full marks. There were over 8000 candidates and only one candidate did better.
- In AS Mathematics, 36 of the 2298 candidates scored full marks. 15 of the 36 candidates were from Dar El Tarbiah

IGCSE JUNE 1994 - DAR EL TARBIAH SCHOOL

Following the issue of the results of the IGCSE examination, I would like to draw your attention to the performance of candidates at Dar El Tarbiah School.

As you know, there were more than 800 candidates from Dar El Tarbiah, entered for a total of about 3250 subjects. The results of the candidates were excellent, making Dar El Tarbiah not only the largest IGCSE School in the world, but also probably one of the best.

For the first time in 1994, UCLES awarded the grade A* (the 'starred' A grade), a grade reserved for only the very best candidates. In the UK and the rest of the world, only about 3% of candidates were awarded this top grade, but in Dar El Tarbiah, the grade was awarded to many more than this. In Computer Studies, for example, almost 25% of the candidates were graded A*, and in Physics 185 out of the 426 Dar El Tarbiah students (43%) were awarded either A* or A. This is a remarkable achievement.

In addition to GCSE, students from Dar El Tarbiah also entered candidates for the Advanced Supplementary (AS) and Advanced Level Examinations. These are higher level examinations which are more demanding than IGCSE. The examinations are taken by UK students aged 18 or 19 and by a large number of candidates throughout the world. As with IGCSE, the results of the Dar El Tarbiah students were remarkably good. In A level Mathematics, all the students were awarded pass grades and almost half were awarded grade A. Even more remarkable, over 400 of the School's students attempted the AS examination in Mathematics, and all but 10 students reached a pass grade with 206 candidates being awarded grade A. The standard of mathematics teaching in the School and the achievement of the candidates must be as good as anywhere in the world.

I have studied the results very carefully, and there are many examples of outstanding achievement amongst the Dar El Tarbiah students. For example, the top mark for English Literature was scored by a candidate from Dar El Tarbiah. We have no way of directly comparing the results of one school with another, but it is unlikely that there is another IGCSE School anywhere in the world which has results as good as Dar El Tarbiah's. Perhaps you would pass on our congratulations, both to the students who did so well, and to the teachers who prepared them so thoroughly.



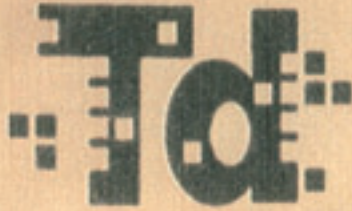
